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DOCUMENTATION FOR THE SWAN FAMILY MEDICAL HISTORY DATASET

Who is included in the frozen dataset:

The SWAN Family Medical History Interview was administered up to two times during follow-up. During the interview, SWAN women answered questions about the current status of immediate family members, family history of various health conditions and maternal experiences of and attitudes towards menopause. The initial interview was completed by 2829 women at one of the SWAN visits - Visit 02 (n=2721), Visit 03 (n=86) or Visit 04 (n=22). The follow-up interview was completed by 2509 women at Visit 06 (n=2272), Visit 07 (n=136), Visit 08 (n=73), Visit 09 (n=26) or Visit 10 (n=2). Overall, 2925 women completed at least one questionnaire, with 2411 completing both, 416 completing only the follow-up and 96 completing only the initial. Two women who completed a questionnaire were dropped because they were identified by the study sites as being adopted, so the final dataset has data from 2923 SWAN women.

The final frozen SWAN Family Medical History dataset uses all available data from both interviews to create the most comprehensive picture of SWAN participants' self-reported family medical histories. Where discrepancies were identified between visits, queries were sent back to the sites to confirm the values on the original forms.

Sites were asked to confirm form values in the following instances:

- Indicated at follow up they did not have a previous family medical history but are in initial data set.
- Follow-up form indicated a previous family history was done but are not in the initial data set
- Mother reported on follow-up form as deceased at initial visit, but in initial data set mother is reported alive
- Father reported on follow-up form as deceased at initial visit, but in initial data set father is reported alive (or unknown)
- Mother's age at death reported at follow-up is younger than age she was reported living at initial visit
- Father's age at death reported at follow-up is younger than age he was reported living at initial visit
- Number of brothers on follow-up form does not match number in initial data set but was indicated as correct
- Number of sisters on follow-up form does not match number in initial data set but was indicated as correct
- Said no previous family history was done but ID is in initial data set, and has different number of brothers
- Said no previous family history was done but ID is in initial data set, and has different number of sisters

If sites could not reconcile the discrepancies between forms, flag variables were created.

Created variables:

All variables in the dataset were created using both versions of the family medical history interview when available. In general, data from the follow-up questionnaire were used when available. If the follow-up visit was not available, data from the initial visit were used.

Parental age and death variables:

Mother and father's vital status, age if alive, age at death and cause of death were created as follows:

- If a woman reported her mother/father alive at both visits (or if only one visit was available), the latest visit was used to obtain the age of the parent.
- If a woman reported her mother/father deceased at the initial visit, and this was confirmed in the follow-up data, the age at and cause of death were taken from the initial visit.
- If a woman reported her mother/father alive at the initial visit, but deceased at the follow-up visit, the age at and cause of death were taken from the follow-up visit.

Immediate family history table:

Women were asked if members of their immediate family had ever “been told by a health care provider that s/he had” any of a list of medical conditions. They were asked questions separately for their mother, father, brothers and sisters. If they indicated that a brother or sister was told they had a specific condition, they were then asked how many brothers or sisters had that condition.

To account for women who reported a family member had a condition in the initial interview, but did not report this in the follow-up interview (responded either “No” or “Don’t Know” to that item in the follow-up interview), a third “uncertain” category was created. These variables had values of 1 for “No”, 2 for “Yes” and 3 for “Uncertain.”

Heart disease variables:

In the initial interview, “heart attack” and “other heart disease” were included in the list of conditions in the immediate family history section where women were asked if their immediate family members had even been told by a health care provider that they had specific medical conditions.

In the follow-up interview, more detailed questions were asked about the family history of heart conditions. Participants were asked if their immediate family members (mother, father, brothers, sisters) ever have “angina (chest pain), a heart attack, or a procedure to open a blocked blood vessel in the heart (bypass surgery or angioplasty).” If she responded yes to a question about a family member having one of these conditions, she was asked if it was before they were 55 (if it was her father or brother) or 65 (if it was her mother or sister). No questions were asked about how many brothers or sisters had these conditions.

In order to reconcile these different ways of asking about family history of heart disease, an “any heart disease” indicator variable was created, and used the following rules (this describes how it was done for the mother variables, but the process was identical for all family members):

- If a SWAN participant had family history data from the follow-up interview and initial interview, if she indicated at the initial interview that her mother had been told she had a heart attack or other heart disease, or if she indicated at the follow up interview that her mother had angina/heart attack/a procedure to open a blocked blood vessel, she was considered as having a “any heart disease,” and got a value of “2” for the final variable (HEARTMOM). Otherwise, if she reported “No” for all of the questions at both interviews, she got a “1”. If she reported “Don’t Know” for any of the conditions at any time point (But not “Yes” to any), she received a value of “3” for that variable, indicating uncertainty.
- If a SWAN participant had data from only the initial interview, she could only report if her mother was told by a health care provider if she had a heart attack or “other heart disease.” If she said “Yes” to either of these conditions, she received a value of “2” for HEARTMOM. If she said “No” to both of them, she received a value of “1”, and if she answered “Don’t Know” to either of them (But not “Yes” to any), she received a value of “Don’t Know” for that variable, using the appropriate SWAN missing code (.C).
- If a SWAN participant only had data from the follow-up interview, her response to the question about angina/heart attack/bypass procedure was used for the final variable (HEARTMOM).
- Only SWAN participants who completed the follow-up questionnaire could respond to the questions about the age of the family member at the time of the event. SWAN participants with only data from the initial interview were assigned missing values for those variables (MOHART65, SIHART65 DAHART55 BRHART55).

Sister table:

The “sister table” was collected at both visits, which contains detailed information about participants’ sisters’ menstrual history. In the initial interview, the “Full/Half” questions were asked for all women in a separate column of the table, but at the follow-up interview these questions were included in the first column of the table and appear to have been skipped for the majority of the sample (for example, 2089 of the 2210 women who had at least 1 sister did not respond to this question for her first sister). Because the most recent information about participants’ family medical history was wanted, the full/half questions were dropped and the latest information available for participants was used. If a woman had a follow-up interview, her data from that interview was used for the sister data in the final dataset. If a woman only had data from the initial interview, that data was used, but the full/half-sister questions were dropped from that data. At the initial interview, women had up to 16 sisters, but at the follow-up visit the maximum number of sisters any participants had was 12.

An attempt to reconcile differences between initial and follow-up interviews was not made due to the passage of time, so it is possible that women reported different sisters on the follow-up interview than the initial interview. There were indicator variables in the follow-up data set for if each sister was previously reported (PRVREP1-PRVREP22), but these variables were only used on the 03/01/2002 version of the form, and have even more missingness than the full/half-sister variables (only 30 had non-missing values for this variable for the first sister).

Breast Cancer questions:

Additional detailed questions about family medical history of breast cancer among female relatives were asked at both the follow-up and initial interviews. Breast cancer diagnosis and age at diagnosis were asked for mother, sisters (up to three), maternal and paternal grandmothers, maternal and paternal aunts and any other blood relatives. Data from the follow-up interview was used when possible, and similar coding was used to the variables for the other conditions to reflect uncertainties (i.e. when a diagnosis was reported at the initial interview but not the follow-up, a value of “3” was assigned, and age at diagnosis was assigned a SWAN missing value of .C). In the initial family history data set, women had up to five other relatives. In the follow-up, the maximum number of relatives with breast cancer was 10.

Mother’s menopause questionnaire

In the initial questionnaire, participants were asked about their biological mother’s menopause and also about the attitudes the woman who raised them had towards menopause. This questionnaire was administered to the women at the follow-up interview **only if they did not have a prior interview**. The data from the initial interview was used for women if the skip pattern was followed correctly (i.e. the site indicated on the form that she had a prior interview and skipped the rest of the questions). If the site incorrectly indicated that a woman did not have a prior interview and administered the questionnaire at the follow-up interview then the data from the initial visit was used.

Created Flags

While reconciling the two interviews, some discrepancies were unable to be resolved by the sites. All efforts were made to track down original versions of both interviews, but in some cases a participant’s responses to the two interviews contradicted themselves (e.g. participant’s mother was reported dead at the initial interview but alive at the follow-up). Several of these had to do with several variables in the follow-up interview that required the sites to know whether or not the participant had an initial visit. For example, the question B1 on the follow-up questionnaire asked the interviewer if the participant’s biological mother was reported deceased during the previous family medical history. If the person at the site filling out the form responded “Yes” to this question, but when analysts checked the initial data, the mother was reported living, the site was queried to confirm the values from both visit forms. If they could not be reconciled via the site, that observation was flagged using the flag variable MOMFLAG1.

The following flag variables were created to indicate when these discrepancies could not be resolved:

Changes made to data based on site responses

When discrepancies were identified between the initial and follow-up data, the Coordinating Center worked with the study sites to confirm the values on both sets of forms or to provide correct values. During the process of confirming values with the sites, two SWAN women were identified as having been adopted and were removed from the data set.
